CALDWELL DECISIONS YOUNG AT 'BOAT'

Las Vegas Leroy Caldwell, 35, continued his comeback spurt picking up his fifth straight win Tuesday via an easy 10-round decision over a relatively unknown Rocky Young, originally from the British Honduras but now fighting out of San Antonio, Texas.

Caldwell, expecting an on-rushing Young, was completely caught by surprise to find a back-peddling adversary who spent most of the time covering up around the ropes.

Caldwell, 23-22-5 with

six knockouts, picked up 99-91 on two of the judges' cards and a 99-92 on the other.

the Showboat Hotel Sports Pavilion. John Ellis "The White Tornado" was originally scheduled against Caldwell but became ill a couple days prior to the fight.

Caldwell, who was overmatched in the early part of his career in losing to some of the top heavyweight during the early 1970s, was coming off a 10-round unanimous decision over previously-unbeaten Jeff Shelburg. Earlier this year, he beat Dave "Big Foot" Johnson and Fili Moala.

Wyoming Routs UNLV, 45-21

Television saved the face of the UNLV Rebels last Saturday afternoon at the War Memorial Stadium in Laramie, Wyo., as they wound up 45-21 losers to Wyoming on a windy, wet afternoon.

The television network didn't get the proper feed to its affiliates until the second half and that was about the time UNLV went on the blink.

The Rebels sputtered throughout the first half, fumbling two completed passes and tipping a pass to a Wyoming defender.

Rebel quarterback Sam King, completed 24 of 47 for 271 yards in the losing cause. He was

also charged with three interceptions. King observed, "If we weren't on TV the first half, we really looked bad."

The Rebels gained 276 of their 425 total yards but came away with only 13 points after a series of mistakes which began when Michael Morton fumbled on the game's opening play after scampering 24 yards with a swing pass.

Much of the homecoming crowd of 23,792 stayed to the end, despite only intermittent sunshine and a fourth-quarter drizzle, as the Cowboys avenged earlier 33-26, 28-24 and 12-10 losses to UNLV.

Grand Prix Championship Decided Oct. 17

LAS VEGAS, NV — The season long race for the FORMULA ONE WORLD DRIVING CHAMPIONSHIP will definitely come to an exciting conclusion at the Caesars Palace Grand Prix in Las Vegas October 17, after Frenchman Jacques Laffite captured the rain-delayed Canadian Grand Prix in Montreal.

Laffite, driving for the Tablot-Ligier team, forced the issue of who may be crowned the 1981 champion when he took the lead on the 12th lap and never looked back. It was the second win of the season for Laffite and made him one of three drivers who still have a chance of claiming the title. With the nine points he earned for his win, Laffite now has 43 championship points and is within striking distance of Carlos Reutemann and Nelson Piquet, first and second respectively in standings with 49 and 48 points.

Current leader Reutemann and his Williams teammate Alan Jones bolted from the starting grid with the green light, passing pole sitter Piquet from their respective second and third grid positions. However, Reutemann encountered trouble and soon fell back into the pack. By lap 5, the Argentinian was in 17th place and by lap 13, he was fourth from the last. Reutemann did recover to finish 10th, three laps behind Laffite, but he gained no championship points.

Piquet, of the Brabham team, began the day three points behind Reutemann and was hopeful of keeping his championship chances alive. After a quick start, when he was second to Renault's Alain Prost, Piquet spun off the track on lap 7. The Brazilian did recover and finish strong, taking fifth and gaining two cham-

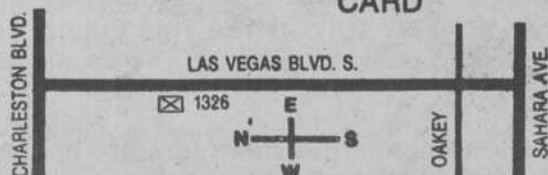

Energy Workshop At Westside Library

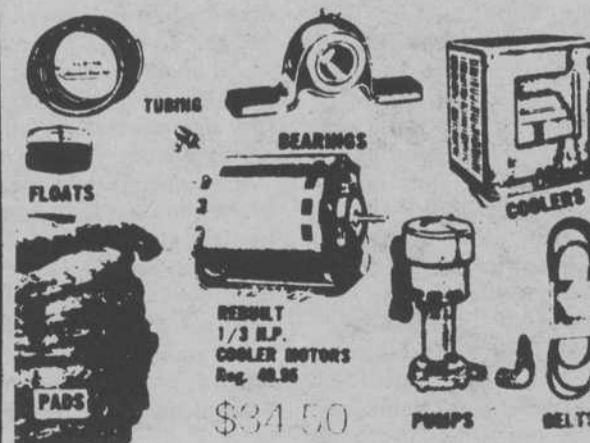
