The pool is built with an entry ramp so that wheelchair-bound youngsters can be pushed by aides right in to the pool while seated in special non-rusting wheelcha

Gets Pilot Grant From Endowment Fund

Does the teaching of occupational and technical courses have to exclude ethical and cultural considerations? From this question

came a study and a proposal by the

Clark County Community College which has resulted in a pilot grant from the National Endownment for the Humanities

The pilot grant, one of few being awarded by the NEH in this year of restrictions, budget totals \$35,556, all the ethical dimensions of college

money requested by CCCC.

The money will be used to develop modular programming by which CCCC will be able to integrate humanities and occupational studies within the college.

The three modules to be developed and tested are (1) Service Ethics: issues related to the ethical dimensions of health occupations. (2) Marketplace Ethics: issues related to the

marketing and (3) business. Technology in Literature: issues related to an awareness of the impact of technology on modern society.

All modules will be thoroughly evaluated by internal and external assessors as well as by

students. After appropriate modifications. the modules will be incorporated into the curriculum of the
