On November 15, 96 representatives from the Clark County School District will board an airplane bound for Washington, D.C. to participate in the national Close Up Foundation program until November 21.

The 84 high school students will be joined by eleven teachers, three District administrators, Robert Forbuss, School Board member and 15 from representatives Gorman High School. In Washington, they will meet 80 representatives from Reno and Carson City to make up the complete Nevada contingent.

During the last school year, 32 Clark County School District students participated in the first Nevada Close Up experience. This year, the program has been expanded to include representatives from Chaparral and Valley High Schools, thereby providing more students with the opportunity to meet with legislators and observe first-hand sophisticated the operation of our federal government.

The Close Up Foundation is a non-profit and multi-partisan organization with no affiliation to any branch of government, political party of special interest group.

Partially financed by the U.S. Congress, the Foundation commits two full fellowships to each participating high school to cover both tuition and transportation costs for one teacher and one student. These fellowships ensure that the Close Up experience is available to all students without regard to family income or academic performance.
