## **Buford Chosen First Black Astronaut For Space Flight**

The first black astronaut chosen for a mission into space greeted the news with excitement and tackled a pile of paperwork to control his enthusiasm.

Lt. Col. Gulon S. Buford, Jr., 39, was assigned Monday as a mission specialist to fly on space shuttle Challenger's 3-day trip set for July 4, 1983.

"The four of us assigned to the STS-8 were called in together and told the news. But they told us that we couldn't tell anyone until it was officially announced. So I went back to my office and fin-Ished some paperwork," said Buford, who is married and father of two teenage boys.

He was among 35 candidates picked in 1978.

Philadelphia-born Buford, one of four blacks in the corps, said becoming an astronaut was "more of an evolutionary thing."


