### Workshop On Solar Water Heating Scheduled

What's better than saving money? Saving money twice. Clark County Community College is offering a Solar Hot Water Workshop, Saturday, May 15, designed to save the average family 80 to 90% on utility bills.

Free information lectures for this Workshop will be held on April 28 at 7 p.m. at the Cheyenne Campus of CCCC, room 2225.

Participants at the Workshop will learn under supervision, assemble two or more solar collectors and plumbing components for installation at their homes. By following the do-it-yourself aspect, the homeowner saves the cost of pre-assembled collec-

tors purchased elsewhere.

Virtually anyone can build the solar collectors and plumbing sub-assemblies, according to Peter Christiansen, Coordinator for the Center for the Appropriate Technology at CCCC. "It's easier than painting by the numbers," says Christiansen.

The Workshops are part of the program developed at Arizona State University. CCCC is one of more than 100 colleges taking part. To date, over 15,000 homeowners have participated in the program.
