In cooperation with the Las Vegas Recreation and Leisure Activities Department, the Clark County School District will host the "Recreation Services for Disabled Children Information Fair" at the Jaycee Park on May 8 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The Fair will provide parents and other adults interested in adapted physical education with information on available public and private programs for the disabled


The playwrights are Jerome Lawrence and Robert Lee, who wrote, among other dramas, the award winning "Inherit The Wind."
