Department of Education Seeks To Block Federal Reductions In Funds

Governor Robert List today directed the State of Nevada Department of Education to begin legal action to block the U.S. Department of Education from using 1970 census data to calculate the federal aid to

education in the state.

Under Chapter 1 of the Education Consolidation & Improvement Act federal assistance to the states for the education of economically and educationally disadvantaged children is based on population counts.

According to the 1970 census, Nevada had 10,890 such children and if these figures are used Nevada could lose as much as \$1.2 million dollars. In the current year, Nevada is receiving \$3.563 million, but only \$3.241 million would be received for next year if the 1970 census figures are used as compared to an estimated \$4.404 million the state would be eligible to receive if the 1980 figures are used.

Nevada is one of 18 states to show an increase between 1970 and 1980 in the number of children between 5 and 17 years of age who are from families below the poverty level.

Nevada's 36 percent growth in eligible children was the largest in the nation.

Budget cuts to date have already resulted in Nevada school districts having to cut special services to economically and educationally disadvantaged children.

A further reduction in these funds, coupled with the decline in financial resources being experienced in the state at this time, would result in even more severe reductions in staff, services, and students being given an equal educational opportunity.
