At the May 27 Board of Directors meeting of the Greater Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce, it was unanimously voted that we would join with the Black Ministers Coalition for Jobs in an effort to seek out new businesses with an eye toward providing more jobs for the members of an eye toward our community.

Recognizing the broad value of such an alliance, it is our desire to work with you and any other sincere organ-izations in soliciting businesses to locate facilities in the greater Las Vegas area.

We consider our first and foremost priority the preparation of an application to be submitted to the Federal government for the designation of portions of southern Nevada as enterprise zones. Toward that end I have appointed a committee which includes Bill Heinrich. Tom Wiesner, Barry Becker, Elena Blake, Art Williams, Ken O'Connell and myself to work directly with your designated representatives in moving forward to accomplish this without delay. We under-stand that this group will also begin to form the necessary corporate structure that will be able to enter into legally binding agreements with those governmental and private agencies applicable in establishing the enterprise zone. It is our clear intent to form a working partnership with you in this matter.


It is our most sincere wish that this union will reflect in a positive way on all members of our community, and we look forward to working with you in a spirit of cooperation and understanding.

The areas under discussion are not particularly suited for industry. In fact, we can't think of a less attractive area for a new industry. SOUTHERN NEVADA has a hard

enough time attracting industry to our most ideal areas, much less trying to plunk one down in the midst or on the fringes of the black Westside. The very idea that industry must be

located in the somewhat depressed and predominantly black areas of Las Vegas merely to employ black workers is questionable thinking in and of itself. particularly when the majority of the blacks living there now travel such relatively short distances for gainful employment now

So, while we think it is a progressive step forward for the Black Ministers Coalition and the Chamber to be talking to one another, let's not kid ourselves about the prospects of new industry being established in the black areas of Las Vegas. That, in our view, is a pipe dream, pure and simple, no matter what the

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
