ARRESTS MADE IN FOOD STAMP FRAUD INVESTIGATION

More than 50 people have been arrested in the sweeping federal and state investigation of food stamp fraud in Nevada and law enforcement personnel continued rounding up suspects at SENTINEL press time.

It was reported that another dozen Individuals received summonses in the matter and four others were to be picked up, said Chief Assistant U.S. Attorney Ed Kane, who is heading up the investigation.

All those arrested will be arraigned at 9 a.m. Friday before U.S. Magistrate Philip Pro.

Under the federal speedy trial act, they must be brought to trial within 60 days after arrest, Kane sald.

The wave of arrests, which began last night, Thursday culminated a joint fourmonth probe by the Department of Agriculture, Secret Service and U.S. Attorney's office.

Federal arrest war-

rants were Issued for 68 persons on food stamp trafficking charges and 44 more face state charges for fraud against the food stamp program.

Food stamp trafficking consists of the IIlegal use of food stamps. Individuals arrested were allegedly using the food stamps for cash. The stamps had an exchange value of 50 cents for a \$1 coupon and were used to purchase cars. television sets, radios, tools, jewelry, guns, auto parts and repairs and drugs.

In a related food stamp fraud report, federal authorities in New Orleans have charged 31 people with food stamp fraud, including Hammond City Councilman Wilbert Dangerfield and a local woman who allegedly obtained \$6,600 in duplicate coupons.

Many of those indicted were grocers who bought coupons at less than face value, or sold Items like liquor and cigarettes · ineligible federal under guidelines - in exchange for stamps.
