Democratic gubernatorial candidate Richard Bryan made jobs and the economy the No. 1 issue of his campaign with the release of his Economic Agenda for the Eighties re-

opportunities and develop a broader tax base," the attorney general said. "To accomplish this goal, the state must become a partner with private enterprise and the leader of a coordinated statewide promotion effort."

Bryan identified a restructured and revitalized Department of Tourism and Economic Development as the primary tool in the state's arsenal to attract new jobs to Nevada.

WAITING CHILDREN

Lonnie is an 11-year-old black boy with a quiet, soft and gentle nature. He has an eager curiosity to explore the smallest detail of everything that crosses his path. Lonnie will seek out his foster family to share a particular experience that he is especially enjoying.

However, Lonnie's social worker will consider a single parent family as well. Lonnie needs the secure and loving support of a permanent family. He is waiting for such a family. How long will this delightful child have to wait?

HOW YOU CAN ADOPT

The children described in this column are waiting for adoption. Nationwide, there are over 300,000 children who, for various reasons, have not found permanent parents. Some have physical, mental or emotional handicaps; some are of mixed racial background; some are older; others are siblings.



Born drug addicted, Lonnie experienced developmental delays. Recently a significant hearing loss was discovered and learning disabilities were identified. Lonnie now wears a hearing aid while in school and participates in an ungraded Learning Disabled class. He is also receiving speech therapy which has been quite a help to him. Lonnie's improvements have been very positive, yet he still needs clear, simple instructions and patient supervision.

The Las Vegas SENTINEL, working with AASK (Aid to Adoption of Special Kids) hopes to find homes for these children. AASK is looking for people who can give love and nurturing to hard-to-place children. Prospective parents may be single or married.

Subsidies (payments to the adopting family each month and medical expenses) are available for many of the children. Subsidies depend on the financial situation of the adoptive family.

Lonnie is a trusting child who easily makes friends. He is cherished by his foster family. Lonnie is responsive and affectionate, always looking forward to hugs and kisses. However, on a deeper level, Lonnie is sad and lonely. A foster family just isn't the same as a "forever" family of your very own. Lonnie wants to be adopted. A two-parent black family with other children would be ideal for Lonnie.
