Owens Ave. The office is financed by a \$100,000 federal community block grant which is to be renewed after a 12-month period if the program shows results. Neighborhood Watch relies on homeowners who keep an eye on each others' property. Members are taught crime awareness consisting of engraving names on property, alarm systems and around-the-clock surveillance. Various meetings and clinics are held frequently to enlighten the populace on these matters. The detectives are experiencing reluctance on a number of residents participating in the program. They are wary. "We're still trying to figure out what's wrong. I don't kow if it's because they have been shafted so many times by unfulfilled government promises and federal agencies that they don't trust us. They just don't understand that we're trying to help them," Harber said. The poster shown in the center (above) is displayed in the windows of the community participants. The officers, however, are very optimistic and see rapid progress developing in the neighborhood. "We know the program will work," said Jett. "We are enthusiastic and we will not lose our faith."
