THE MELODY IS STILL AUDIBLE

NEW YORK CITY — There were two major happenings in the Big Apple last week to keep the legends alive. Though the songs have ended, the melodies linger on in hearts and ears. Down at City Hall official recognition was



finally paid to Joe Louis, the immortal heavyweight, by the city's chief executive officer, Mayor Ed Koch, and a City Hall Plaza full of specially invited VIPs and just plain folks, on lunch hour, and others who are statistics on the unemployment rolls. Recalling June '82 as the 45 ann'y of the Brown

Bomber's defeat of James J. Braddock to become the first black heavyweight champion of the world since Jack Johnson, he further added that Joe's kayo of Max Schmeling, whom he called "Hitler's teutonic symbol," debunked the Nazi myth of racial supremacy. "Joe Louis," he said, "went on to become, not only one of the greatest athletes in the world, but one of the most beloved and respected as well. He was an authentic American Hero. He still is. When Black Americans were oppressed by racism and injustices, Joe Louis made us see what an end to segregation could accomplish. He made us proud to be Americans and, by his example, he made us realize that we could be better than we were."

"Today we honor this

remarkable man by beginning an annual Joe Louis Memorial College Scholarship, to be awarded to a N'York City public High School Senior who excels in both athletic and academic skills. This \$2000 annual scholarship has been made possible by the Joe Louis Memorial Scholarship Award Committee." Steve J. Ross, who is chairperson of Warner Communications, chairs this committee. The first Scholarship was awarded to Gregory Martin who just graduated from George Washington High, Bklyn. He is an outstanding track star and will be attending Boston U. in the fall. Attorney Martha Louis, widow of the late great champ, topped the VIP guest list, which included former heavyweight champ, Floyd Patterson and Sugar Ray Leonard. Councilman Fred Samuel, who has been working on a major NYC Memorial to Joe Louis, was credited by the Mayor as planting the seed which caused Herb Williams of the Community Action Bd.,
