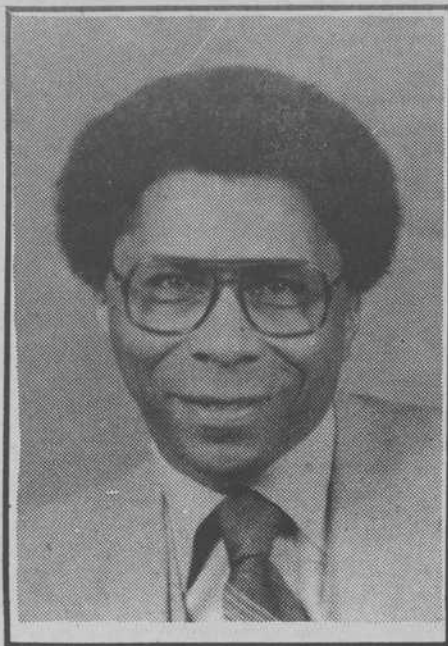

**URBAN POLICY
REPORT NOW
AVAILABLE TO
THE PUBLIC**

The 1982 National Urban Policy Report, the latest in a series prepared every two years by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development at the request of Congress, is now available to the public from the Superintendent of Documents.

When HUD Secretary Samuel R. Pierce, Jr., sent the report to Congress recently, he pointed out that the foundation for the Administration's urban policy is the Economic Recovery Program. "If cities are to prosper," he said, "our economy must be healthy and vital. Stabilizing and revitalizing our national economy is the single most important task we have in carrying out a Federal urban policy in the 1980's."

The 187-page report sets our urban policy priorities which include, in addition to the emphasis on economic growth, the role of local leaders in strengthening their communities and the creation of experimental enterprise zones in distressed inner cities.

In releasing the document Secretary Pierce said, "The Administration views its urban policy as an evolving one which would achieve a better balance of resources and responsibilities among the Federal, State and local governments."

CHILDREN**

Two-year-old Jessie is a little boy with very profound special needs. A family is being sought that would have the necessary love, time and patience to cope with his many problems.



Jessie is severely handicapped both physically and mentally and will always be totally dependent on others for all his needs. Jessie has no self-help skills. He spends his time in a wheelchair or lying down. He has poor coordination and is quite unresponsive. He does have seizures and is on medication to control them.

Jessie is a child with a complicated medical and social history. His problems were caused by meningitis and cerebral bleeding. He has a twin brother who is normal and also an older brother. Both of these boys have been already placed in adoptive families.

Jessie's prognosis for the future is poor at best. However, he needs a family who would be willing to invest themselves in continually exploring his potential. All families

will be considered for this little boy.

HOW YOU CAN

ADOPT

The children described in this column are waiting for adoption. Nationwide, there are over 300,000 children who, for various reasons, have not found permanent parents. Some have physical, mental or emotional handicaps; some are of mixed racial background; some are older; others are siblings.

The Las Vegas SENTINEL, working with AASK (Aid to Adoption of Special Kids) hopes to find homes for these children. AASK is looking for people who can give love and nurturing to hard-to-place children. Prospective parents may be single or married.

Subsidies (payments to the adopting family each month and medical expenses) are available for many of the children. Subsidies depend on the financial situation of the adoptive family.
