PUBLIC TV TO LOOK AT 300 YEARS OF LIFE, IN NEW YORK'S HARLEM COMMUNITY

Independence, pride, self-sufficiency, conflict and renewal are the characteristics that make Harlem one of the world's truly extraordinary communities.

"I Remember Harlem" is a series of four one-hour programs which displays the vivid memories of Harlem

Harlem has been a home, a retreat, a nurturing ground and an inspiration, not just for New York's Black community, but for Dutch, Irish, Italian, Jewish, Spanish and Finnish residents as well. Alexander Hamilton, Captain William Kidd, Langston Hughes, W.C. Handy, Duke Ellington, Billie Holliday, Joe Louis, Sugar Ray Rob-Inson and Paul Robeson are all part of the Harlem story.

More stories of life in Harlem are told by long-time residents such as a 96-year-old man who remembers the blizzard of 1888, an ex-chorus girl at the Cotton Club, a Jewish businessman who recalls the one black family on his

block, a retired numbers runner who teaches the secrets of his business and a black musician who performed in the heyday of Harlem's nightclub life. Residents remember amateur night at the Apollo, the night Joe Louis licked Max Schmeling, the visits of kings, queens, emperors and the Pope. They describe the building and rebuilding,

the noise, the crime, the drugs and the gangs. They also recount a certain safe feeling of knowing that neighbors were looking out for you when your mother went to work.



PRODUCER WILLIAM MILES and cameraman/editor Richard Adams on location for I REMEMBER HARLEM, a 4-part series tracing nearly 400 years of Harlem's history. Each one-hour segment weaves together live interviews, rare film clips, photographs, early prints and lithographs to give a picture of Harlem that has not been seen before.
