ROBERT FORBUSS SELECTED PRESIDENT OF NIAA

The Nevada Interscholastic Activities Association has been reorganized under the Nevada Revised Statutes to reflect the student population in Nevada. The governing board for student activities and sports, the **NIAA formerly was**

composed of representatives of different schools throughout the state.

Under the reorganization, student population is the new criteria for determining representation from different countles. Clark County has been allo-

cated five of the nine membership seats on the NIAA Board. This was computed on the ratio of one seat for each 5,000 students involved in NIAA activitles.

Once each county was given its allocation, the individual School Boards selected persons to fill the membership seats. Then, in August, these nine members voted Robert Forbuss president by unanimous decision.

Forbuss, who also serves as vice presi-dent of the Clark Coun-School District (CCSD) Board of Trustees, is joined on the NIAA Board by CCSD representatives: Ward Gubler, Rancho High School principal; Terry Mannion, Director of Secondary Education; Gary Cameron, Moapa Valley Junior/Senior High School principal; and Bruce Miller, Director of Student Activities.

FREE/REDUCED PRICED MEALS **Clark County School District students may** qualify for eligibility in the National School Lunch and/or School Breakfast Programs. This program, eliminated at the senior high schools, is still available at all elementary schools, sixth grade centers and junior high schools.

Family size and income criteria determine eligibility accord-Ing to guidelines established by the federal government. Children from families whose income is at or below the levels are eligible.

To qualify, parents must complete an application form which is available at all elementary, sixth grade centers and junior high school offices and cafeterlas. Dan A. McPartlin, coordinator of the CCSD food service department, will review the applications and determine eligibility. All information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of evaluation.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the school year. Students who received free or reduced meals last year must file a new application this year. Also, if the family size or income changes at any time during the year, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may

make the children eligible for reduced price meals, or free meals if the family income falls below the indicated levels.

All completed applications must be returned to the school office with a statement of Income, paycheck stub, family size plus a signed certification by the parent or guardian that the information is correct.

In certain cases foster children are eligible for these benefits.

The school nutrition programs will not discriminate against any child because of race, color, national origin, sex, age or handlcap.
