

Canela meets an upand-coming youngster from Reno, Frankie Davis, in a 10-rounder while Schwenke will battle in another 10-rounder against a yet-to-be-determined opponent. Santana, Butler and Sawyer will be in six-rounders also against yet-to-be-selected

Chavez, from Hawthorne, Calif., has been very impressive his past two fights, halting Jose Coronado at the Showboat in August and then Hugo Partida last month.

Chavez is a scrapper, and he could give Petty a lesson or two. Those tricks of the trade were picked up, in part, during bouts against Willie "Birdlegs"

Canela, from Colton, Calif., and Schwenke, from Salt Lake City, are two of the most prized prospects in their weight division in the West. Canela has knocked out 10 of his past 12 opponents, in-cluding Renaldo Rogue,

14 straight wins, he was upset by James Williams at the Showboat, losing a 10-round verdict. During that bout Schwenke reinjured his hand, the same hand he broke last year and which kept him out of action for nine months. His only other fight this year was in May at the Showboat when he stopped Jesse Avala in the first.
