## HORNE IS PLENTY MAD

N'YORK CITY - Too many soapbox orators, those megalomaniacs who fashion themselves leaders of "their" people, too often forget those who made it possible for them to take such a stand without having to take a fall. Lovely Lena Horne's situation in Dallas, Tx., is a case in point. Here's how the story was carried nationally, and we quote.

"Lena refuses to be Pawn:" - Lena Horne has canceled an upcoming engagement of her (special) Tony Award-winning musical in Dallas to avoid being "Caught in the middle" of a local racial dispute.

The dispute involved a charity showing of "Lena Horne - The Lady And Her Music." Tickets to the opening night show were to range from \$50 to \$600, with proceeds to go to "Action For Cultural Arts," in Dallas.

When Tickets prices were announced, City Councilwoman Elsie Faye Heggins, who is black, charged that the price was a form of discrimination against blacks.

"Charity is something which should be supported by people who can afford it; regardless of their col-

or," said Ms. Horne. "Ms. Heggins used my name to draw national attention to a local issue, and I was made a pawn of some

local politicians. I do not want to be caught in the middle of a local dispute."
