Donna and her sister Ineta sang lead with John Springer & Bread, a contemporary gospel group who appeared with many choirs, including those of the Rev. James Cleveland and the Academy Cathedral's 1978 LP.

Donna still fostered hopes of singing R&B and pop music, however, and recorded demo tapes in Los Angeles. Capitol signed her immediately upon hearing the demos and released her first album, For The Sake Of Love, in 1980.

During the past two years, Donna has performed concerts and surrounded herself with a bevy of talented people, including Chuck Jackson, Natalie Cole, and Aretha Franklin. Chuck produced her second album in 1981, entitled Going For The Glow. This album is a platter

Her gospel training has helped her in vocal deliveries much in the same way church choir backgrounds helped Donna's influences, Gladys Knight and Chaka Khan.

Then he substantiates his statement by pointing out some of life's greater absurdities, and the fun really begins. Like if O.J. Simpson can fly (as he does in his Hertz commercial), why does he need a Rent-a-Car? And, what's he doing at the airport anyway?

Yes, it's a crazy world, and George Wallace is dedicated to preserving it in that condition. "A lot of people go on stage and do an act, but I go on stage to have fun," he says. "I might play with people. We might sing. We're going to be in a living room and we're going to be relaxed. My job is to go out there and make vou forget your

Born in Atlanta, Wallace decided at an early age that he was going to become a comedian and began to study the comedy greats that were performing regularly on television. "I was encouraged tremendous-ly by Red Skelton," he says. "I especially loved his characters, like Freddie the Freeloader and Clem Caddidlehopper."
