
## Education

#### **CCCC Offers Nursing Refresher** Course

**Nursing Refresher** and Comprehensive Medical-Surgical Review Course will be offered by Clark County Community College, (CCCC) Cheyenne Cam-pus Annex located in the Baptist Church, Cheyenne Blvd., N. Las Vegas. Classes will begin February 3, 1983.

The course will cover current scientific principles and system disorders and current therapy. In addition, the course will include a one-week skills workshop and supervised clinical experience. The course content will meet the requirements of continuing education units (c.e.u.) for nurses.

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#### Instructor Speaks At Conference On Office Automation

The United States Department of Energy sponsored a conference on Office Automation. Sandra Goodwin, instructor at Clark County Community College (CCCC) spoke on the educational process of retraining the office work force, which is a nationwide unemployment condition. She reported that today's office is quite sophisticated with word-processing terminals located on most every desk.

Goodwin said. "There was an intense awareness of the reality of "change" felt throughout the conference; especially, when it was reported that 50 million office workers had to be retrained."

Goodwin points out the time has come to explore the "change" in equipment and procedures of expediting the office tasks. The work force can no longer be computer illiterates or no longer resist the automated-electronic equipment.

This is a perfect example, stated Goodwin, where business and educational institutions could form a parternship to help out our society back to work. Business nor educational institutions can do all the work of retraining; it must be a joint effort of knowledge, equipment, and financial assistance.

SAN FRANCISCO -(Dec. 20, 1982) - The Veterans Administration has announced beginning Jan. 1, 1983, United States Government Life Insurance (USGLI) policyholders will no longer be required to pay premiums for their coverage.

United States Government Life Insurance policies were issued generally to World War I veterans and are prefixed by the letter "K."
