N'YORK CITY .. According to Tom Poe, program director, KAPE/AM, San Antonio, Tx., Black Radio is in danger of becoming extinct. He let it be known through Jack The Rapper, that it isn't panic time yet, but there are definitely subtle moves in that direction. He said that knowingly, or for greed, Blacks are an integral part of this move. His write hand further pointed out that radio and music are super big business and that in spite of a shaky economy, Black Music is doing well and that this subtle raid on black formats is a recent undertaking. Poe's rich thoughts are that it had its beginning with "Urban Contemporary," a name given to an ebony and ivory mix with most of the emphasis on Black. Someone convinced Black programmers and gen'mgrs that the "Urban" label would sell more easily than "Black", which has some credence. "Urban Contemporary," as a format, is still doing well, although each year it appears to lose some of its appeal according to the major radio survey. My problem with "Urban Contemporary" goes much deeper than music. As pop music takes an increasingly bigger slice of Black formats, the pop side of the music world continues to maintain a very limited number of Black artists. There is a gross lack of parity. Blacks in high places are aware of the plight of Black Radio. For obvious reasons they are not speaking out. In '80 it appeared to be cool to go along with the program and this letter is not to condemn anyone. However, it is to ask every person in the street to make an effort the lowa to bring about change. You are the boss. Now is the time for Black listeners to dump the rep. that they won't participate in radio surveys, or are willing to share the responsibility for the demise of Black Radio."
