SUMMER FOOD SAFETY

Summertime brings up images of juicy grilled steaks, barbequed chicken, sunshine and fresh air.

Unfortunately, it can also bring up something must less pleasant...food poisoning.

Illness does not always occur when a person eats tainted food, says Ellen Schuster, Nutritionist for the Clark County Cooperative Extension Service.

However, the headache, diarrhea, vomiting, abdominal cramps and fever, symptoms similar to those of flu, aren't worth the risk. Though rarely fatal, food poisoning can severely affect infants, the elderly and people who are already ill, she warned.

Proper food handling reduces the possibility of food poisoning.

Pick up meat and poultry products last at the supermarket. Have them bagged with other cold foods and get them home and into the freezer or the refrigerator as soon as possible.

"Don't leave groceries in the car while you run other errands," she warned. "As foods get warm, the germs quickly multiply to dangerous levels."

The safest way to thaw frozen meat or poultry is in the

refrigerator.

Food may also be thawed in watertight wrapping under cold water.

Wash all work surfaces and utensils before and after using them for raw meat or poultry. Hands should also be washed to prevent cross contamination.

Pack perishable picnic goods, including hotdogs and lunchmeats, in a well insulated cooler with plenty of ice. Do not open the cooler unnecessarily and put it in a shaded place to prevent the ice from melting.

Thorough cooking of dishes that contain poultry, eggs, fish, milk or meat products will reduce the risk of salmonella poisoning, staphloccal intoxication and trichinosis.

Canned products do not generally require special treatment, but should be eaten immediately after being opened.

"If the food looks or

smells suspicious, or if liquid spurts when the container is opened, don't even taste the contents. Botulism toxins can become so potent that a mere tast can be fatal," Schuster warned.

Bulging or dented cans are sign of deterioration. Throw them away.

"If you suspect a food may be tainted for any reason, destroy it. Don't feed it to pets or other animals," she said.

Leftovers should be returned to the cooler as soon as everyone is finished eating. Use enough ice to deep the food safe until it can be put back in the refrigerator.

"If you remember to keep hot foods hot, cold foods cold, and everything clean, you'll have a safer, more enjoyable summer," Shcuster added.
