The voices of Fredi Grace & Rhinstone have already been partially responsible for two major successes: one of the blockbuster hit records of 1980, and victorious political campaign. The chorus hook that helped take the S.O.S. Band's platinum single, "Take Your Time, Do It Right" to the top of the charts was executed with the vocal support of Fredi, Keigh and Sweeper. And when Andrew Young ran for mayor of Atlanta, this trio wrote, sand and produced the rousing jingle that became Young's campaign anthem.

Fredi, Keith and Sweeper come from diverse areas of the country, but they discovered each other through their common passion for music in the city of Atlanta. Sweeper and Keith both had parents who were ministers, while Fredi's grandfather was a minister — in other words, all three were singing in church choirs from an early age, but as they point out, not necessarily loving every minute of it.

Fredi and Keith met in college, where both were involved in music. Kelth, in fact, was musical director of one of the major plays done at school. They met Sweeper when she came of Atlanta after graduation, and, in 1976, the three of them hooked up with an 11-person group called Shine, which gave them limited recording experience. They met in the evenings to write songs, but in order to survive, they got into background singing and studio work, sometimes as a trio, but often going their separate ways.

The session singing period brought the members of the group into contact with some interesting people. There was onstage work with the rock group Sea Level, a spinoff of the Allman Brothers, and for Fredi, there was a memorable experience working as a backup vocalist for Freda Payne. The most fateful meeting though, was a demo session that Fredi and Sweeper worked on, for a song called "We're the Best of Friends." Written by Ed Howard, it was originally intended for Roberta Flack and Ed's friend and colleague Donny Hathaway, who died tragically before the song could be recorded. It eventually became a big hit for Peabo Bryson and Natalie Cole, but for Ed, the real discovery was meeting Fredi, Sweeper and Keith at that demo date. The group's most important RCA

All songs are original, except for "Tell Me What's On Your Mind," wirtten and produced by Peabo Bryson, who shares the same management company with the group.

Their latest LP entitled TIGHT is fastly moving up on the charts. It includes singles such as "One Man's Woman," "Work It Out," "Dog Eat Dog World," and the title tune "Tight."

Whatever brought these three talented individuals together now promises a long and fruitful recording career ahead.
