This year's NYSP at UNLV ran Monday through Friday starting June 6 and ending on July 8 with all daily activities being held in the McDermott Paul **Physical Education** Complex at UNLV.

The NYSP provides a constructive outlet for summer time energies of the nation's youth at no cost to the participants.

The program is a partnership operated by the **Community Services** Administration in Washington, D.C., the National Collegiate Athletic Association, and specially selected institutions of higher learning like UNLV. All of the partners provide funds for the NYSP.

Pittman also related, "Many needy and underprivileged young people were aided by the NYSP which provided sports training, athletic competition, and exposure to the benefits of higher education on an unprecedented scale. Expert instruction and competent supervision were available along with the use of superior

facilities which many youngsters might not have had a chance to use or enjoy."

five-week The program provided instruction for boys and girls, ages 10 to 16 in the following sports: swimming, basketball, volleyball, racquetball, gymnastics, weight training, dance, and camp crafts. In addition, a class for cultural enrichment was conducted daily, free lunch was provided in the UNLV cafeteria and transportation was available on certain designated routes. And each qualified participant received a free medical examination.

The teachers included college and high school coaches; in addition, many athletes worked as staff members.

This program is one of total involvement by campuses and communities throughout the country. The NYSP allows colleges and universities to participate more fully in community life while helping to solve some of that community's problems.
