

Recently star golfer Tom Watson successfully defended his famed British Open Championship. The prestige of the title is unquestioned, the defen-

se of it is virtually unheard of.

This past weekend, veteran Calvin Peete defended his less-known Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic title in dramatic fashion as the Louisiana native continues to make quite a name for himself as the most productive black golfer to ever grace the tour with his presence.

Peete, who tamed the Kingsmill Golf course in Williamsburg, Va., a year ago to win the title, rallied in the final round to win by a single stroke while

collecting a \$63,000 paycheck.

Better known as "Cal" these days, Peete is in the midst of his second consecutive successful season, and is already one of the top moneywinners in 1983, having currently amassed some \$262,658 in earnings.

Currently in full swing at UNLV is one of the frontrunners in summer basketball tournaments, the Las Vegas Invitational, a tourney that annually attracts top high school basketball players and many college coaches.




