

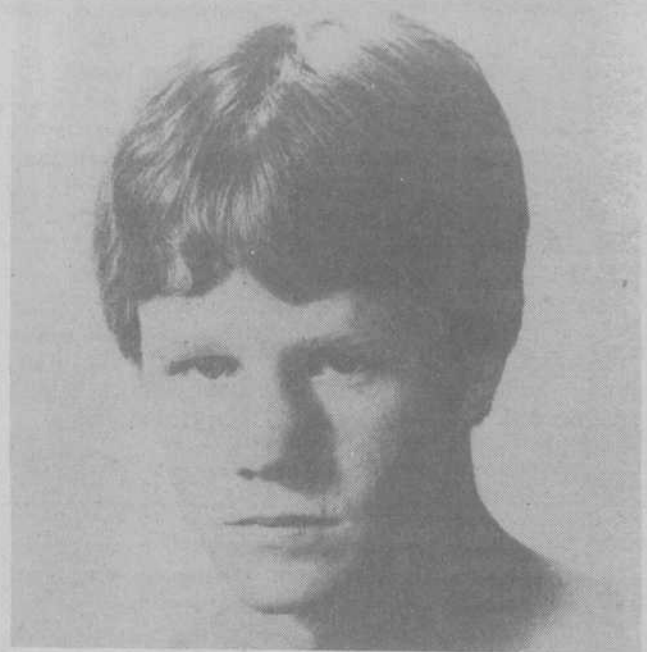

Carl Lewis Leads U.S. Sprint Sweep

Carl Lewis led the Americans to a medal sweep in the men's 100-meter dash Monday but injury struck U.S. world record-holder Evelyn Ashford in the women's 100 at the World Track and Field Championships.

It was the first U.S. medal sweep in a major 100-meter event since the 1912 Stockholm Olympics. And the outcome marked the return of the Americans to the forefront in sprinting a year before the Los Angeles Olympics.

In the only other final, Poland's Zdzislaw Hofman captured the triple jump with a leap of 57 feet, 2 inches, beating American Willie Banks and Nigeria's Ajayi Agbepaku, who both had 56-4 1/2.

More than 1,500 athletes, representing all five continents and more than 120 countries, are assembled for this seven-day event at the site of the 1952 Olympics.

It is the greatest gathering of track stars since the 1972 Munich

Olympics. In 1976 several African nations boycotted the Montreal Olympics and the United States pulled out of the 1980 Moscow Olympics.

The battle for the men's sprint crown lived up to expectations with Lewis unleashing his characteristic late burst to claim victory in 10.07 seconds and raise his three-gold medal hopes which continue with the long jump and the 4 x 100-meter relay later in the meet.

Ashford, who took the world record from Marlies Gohr of East Germany with a time of 10.79 last month, was hoping to add the World Championship gold to her honors. But her dreams were shattered when she pulled up with a torn hamstring muscle in her right leg after 40 meters.

The 26-year-old from Venice, Calif., staggered to the ground and was taken off the track on a stretcher amid a posse of medical assistants. She will be sidelined at least two months.

Nevada All-Stars Face Los Angeles Best At 'Boat'

Five Western Regional and State champions, including Las Vegans Ruben Posada, Joe Salomone and Ron Hashbrouck, pace a team of Nevada all-stars against the best from the Greater Los Angeles area in an amateur boxing show Saturday, Aug. 20, at the Showboat Hotel, Casino, Country Club and Bowling Center.

The 21-year-old Posada is both the Amateur Boxing Federation-USA Western Regional and Nevada Golden Gloves champion at 147 pounds. The 24-year-old Salomone is the ABF-USA Western Regional champ at 156 pounds while the 17-year-old Hashbrouck is the Nevada Golden Gloves king at that weight.

The two other standouts on the team assembled by tournament director Lt. Hal Miller are 18-year-old Bobby Adamson of Carson City, the ABF-USA state and Nevada Golden Gloves champion at 139, and 26-year-

old Mike Martino of Reno, the Western Regional Golden Gloves and state ABF-USA champ at 165.

The card, which will consist of 15 to 20 bouts, including 12 against the Los Angeles squad in the Olympic weight divisions, begins at 7 p.m. Doors to the Showboat Sports Pavilion open at 6:30.

Two relay teams from Las Vegas have qualified for the National Hershey Track & Field Youth Program Finals Aug. 13.

Hundreds of Nevada youths participated in the events hosted by the City of Las Vegas Department of Recreation.

From five Western states, which included Nevada, California, Hawaii, Utah and Arizona, 60 qualified.

Las Vegas will be represented by Kevin Soares, Chuck Porter, Kevin Washington and Reggie Henderson in the 4 x 100 meter relay for boys 11-12. They placed second and third in previous years.

Then Tony Williams, Tracy Mays, Stacy Pipen and Lamont Logan qualified for the 4 x 100 meter relay for boys 9-10.

Other world-ranked fighters in action on the card promoted by Don King Productions in association with the Showboat include Azumah Nelson of

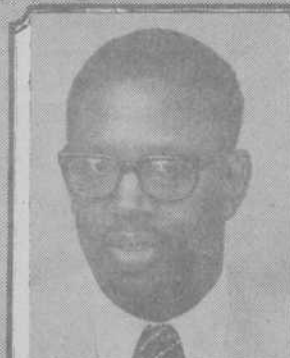
