THE WRITE TO **BEEF OUT LOUD**

N'YORK CITY -- Many things happen on a local, national and international level which often raise the blood in my veins. After it gets to a point, I figure I had better say something, else pop goes the vessel. This is one of those times. For example, from this eye point of view the United States Commission on Civil Rights, the one which Pres. Reagan has accused been of emasculating, in its June Update report, **'83** missed an opportunity to hit one for democracy with the turn of a phrase. In releasing the findings of A Washington Post -**ABC-News Opinion Poll,** it states that "Prejudice is a major factor in presidential vote." Yet, the report starts out with the fact that only 29% of total voting the population would refuse to vote for a woman. 18% would refuse to vote for a black for the the white house while just 16% would deny their votes to a Jewish candidate. In the write minds of the Commish., that was the big news. WRONG! -- The big news, which would have made heartening more headlines were these facts: "79% of those sampled said they would vote for a Jew; 71% would suport a black and 68% would vote for a woman. A winning margin of 56% said that any of the three would get their vote.

When this piece of information landed on the runway of my eyes it was a pride striking blow that the Civil Rights body played up the prejudice factor rather than the startling facts that democracy just might be found alive and working at the polls. What really threw me for a loop was the manner in which the media, print and electronic, including the black press, headlined the negative aspects of the findings rather than the positives. It read as though they wanted to continue the myth that hate is based on color, religion, sex and the origin of birth, rather than taught. It is a sickness which is more than skin deep adn transcends race, religion or place of birth. It was the further interest that the report brought out that people 61 and plus were more reluctant about supporting a Black or Jewish candidate while those 45 and beyond were set against supporting a woman for the top office. 85% of those 18-30 said they woull have no problems supporting a Black or Jewish person in a bid for the Oval Office. 78% of that group would support a femme. It also revealed that Westerners were more tolerant than folks from other sections. Suburbanites, moreso than big city dwellers, small town folks and rural residents. Wealthy people were found to be more tolerant than those with low incomes. While those with some college learning were less blased than those with a hi'school diploma. Those with less than a 12th grade education and folks 61 or older were among the least
