It was announced Friday by the University of Nevada Board of Re-gents, that Dr. Paul E. Meacham, executive dean of Austin Community College in Austin, Tex. has been named the new president of the Clark County Com-

munity College in North Las Vegas. Dr. Meacham succeeds Dr. Judith Eaton, who resigned earlier this summer to become the president of a community college in Philadelphia last month.

47-year-old Meacham, who won the post over at least five CCCC em-ployees. "I was impressed with what I saw when I came to Las Vegas."

Board of Regents Chairman Jack McBride noted that Clark County Community College is the largest community college in the state, thus making the selection of the new president "particularly important because of the growth of the college

and the particular needs of the Clark County area." The college has more than 10,000 students enrolled this year.

Regent June Whitley, who headed the search committee said, "Dr. Meacham fits in most comfortably and compatibly with Nevada's thrust to diversify its economy. We were most impressed with his ability and experience."

Dr. Meacham will take over his new post on Nov. 1.


