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For A King In '86 WASHINGTON, D.C. Informed White House sources have it that President Reagan's opposition has softened regarding a national holiday reminder of the immortality of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and democracy's obligations to all Americans. The expectation that he will not oppose the bill to make January's third Monday a national "Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Holiday" has all but insured passing action by the Senate where defeat was heretofore anticipated. The House has already passed a bill to start such a day, fit for a King, in '86. It's ironic that Howard Bennett, the King of the grassroot activists, did not survive long enough to enjoy the fruits of his long and tireless campaign. Over the years he collected millions of signatures employing the Congress and the White House to so honor Dr. King and

the first legal national holiday in recognition of a Black American who brought so much na-tional and international honor and dignity to a nation's promise of equality to its huddle of humanity. A multi-million selling recording artist, a multiple Grammy Award winner whose hit records have consistently topped jazz, pop and soul charts, George Benson's distinctive combination of voice and guitar has created new standards of musical excellence.

Breezin' was Benson's first album on Warner Bros. Records' label and it proved to be an auspicious debut. "This Masquerade," the only vocal cut on an otherwise instrumental album became the first song in music history to hold the number one spots on jazz, pop and soul charts. Breezin' went on to earn three Grammy awards in 1976, including Best Pop Instrumentalist and Best R&B Instrumental. It remains the best selling jazz album of all time.

In Flight was George's million-selling 1978 follow-up. Later that year he scored another smash single with a live version of the Drifters' classic, "On Broadway," from yet another platinum selling album, Weekend In L.A. That LP garnered him a Grammy for Best Male R&B Performance in 1978. Livin' Inside Your Love, Benson's 1979 offering, was followed a year later by Give Me The Night, home for two more top ten hits, the title cut and "Love X Love."

In Your Eyes is George Benson's seventh album. It contains ten songs by some of today's top composers, with instrumental and vocal support by a host of special guest artists. It includes the hit

George Benson began playing the guitar at the age of 8. He sang in a R&B combo led by his cousin. At age 19, he joined veteran grit organist Jack McDuff's group in the early 60's.

Besides leading his own bands, Benson has worked and recorded with an impressive roster of outstanding artists who are as varied in esthetic sensibility as saxophonists Hank Crawford and Stanley Turrentine, singer Esther Phillips, and trumpeters Freddie Hubbard and Miles Davis.

George Benson has established a style of his own and he will continue to go "Breezin" through the music industry and our minds for a long time to come.
