Lakeside is the electrifying 9-man band recording for Solar Records distributed by Elektra Asylum Records. Their story began in Dayton, Ohio, a place that is famous for American's most established self-contained Funk Bands. Bound almost mysteriously together in 1969, Lakeside, then known as The Ohio Lakeside Express, had won over the city of Dayton and the surrounding Tri-State area, playing prestigious local clubs as well as opening for popular name bands visiting the city.

After three years of local gigs in that area the group decided to pack up the and head west. Armed with a U-haul and \$70 cash, Lakeside made their way across the country to Los Angeles. Steve Shockley, guitarist, had contacts there, so the band had no problem becoming a house band for a hotel, exchanging their talents for room and board. Shortly after the group changed its name to simply Lakeside, they started getting gigs in local clubs, namely, Maverick's Flat, a place known for discovering fresh new talent. Pretty soon the word was out that a hot new band had invaded the city of Los Angeles.

It was during this period that the group met producer Frank Wilson, who signed them with ABC Records. However, the timing wasn't good due to the fact that they came during the ABC's powerful political turmoil. Their debut LP got lost in the shuffle and the group didn't hesitate to leave the label.

Fortunately, their manager Dick Griffey had just begun his Solar label and it all came together with "Shot Of Love," their first album for the label. This LP was produced by Griffey and Leon Sylvers, and it entailed a little bit of everything. Powerful instrumentals, dynamite funk tunes, and med-tempo good listening music.

Their next album, "Rough Riders," included all original tunes, namely the hit single "Pull My Strings." "Fantastic Voyage," their third album was a classic. It combined the funk of "Fantastic

Voyage" and "Your Love Is On The One," with sentimental ballads like "I Need You" and "Say Yes."

Lakeside's 1981 LP, Your Wish Is My Command was their next smash hit album. It included the hit singles, "Magic Moments," "I Want To Hold Your Hand," "Something About That Woman" and the title song.

Their latest album, Untouchables, is definitely just that. There aren't too many albums that can touch it. With songs like "Raid," "Turn The Music Up," "Real Love" and the title cut, they really have a winner on their hands.

Lakeside is definitely a group that has combined the best of both worlds. Their versatility can be compared with the best of them, which means that they are undoubtedly one of the best!
