Poet Laureate Lucille Clifton To Read Poetry At Flamingo Library

Lucille Clifton, poet laureate of Maryland and one of America's most distinguished writers, will read her poetry 7 p.m. Thursday in the Flamingo Library auditorium.

Clifton is best known for her highly popular work, "Two-Headed Woman," winner of the prestigious Juniper Prize for Poetry, sponsored by the University of Massachusetts Press. Its editors described the book as "a combination of unflinching perception and generous compassion."

Clifton lives in Baltimore and is married with six children and one grandchild. She is currently the Jenny Moore Visiting Lecturer in creative writing at Georgetown University. Her works include four volumes of poetry, a memoir entitled "Generation" and 18 children's books, among which are the award-winning Everett Anderson series.

Clifton's prize'winning career has grown steadily since she won the 1969 YM-YWHA Poetry Center Discover Award. Clifton's reading is the second in the "Desert Readings" poetry/discussion series sponsored by the Allied Arts Council and funded by

e the Nevada Humanities rt Committee. This year's series follows the theme "The Role of the Poet in an Endangered World." y It is free to the public.

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
