UNLV'S CUNNINGHAM SELECTED TO KODAK ALL-AMERICAN TEAM

UNLV's Randall Cunningham, standout quarterback and punter was selected as the first team punter on the 1983 Kodak All-American football team as chosen by the American Football Coaches Association, fulfilling a dream of UNLV's standout punter and quarterback.

While there are other All-American teams such as those selected by United Press International, the Associated Press and The Sporting News, the Kodak team is special to Cunningham because his brother, former University of Southern California star running back Sam "Bam" Cunningham was named to it.

"Sam has a yellow sweater at home with a big patch on it and that's why I always remember he won that award," he said. "And that makes it a big award to me.

Also, being the first All-American at UNLV, I'm so pleased it's hard to say something. All I can think about is the people who helped me achieve it.'

The Kodak team was selected by 137 Division I-A coaches and many observers consider it the All-America team because coaches are better judges of athletic talent than the media, which selected the UPI and AP teams.

Cunningham was somewhat disappointed he was named to the team as punter rather than quarterback but admits his double positions may have been a factor in making the team at all.

"When you look in the newspaper every Tuesday, you see my name in the stats in passing and punting," he said. "When you do a dual duty, it

helps you to achieve more goals."

Cunningham averaged 43.5 yards per punt this season but that ranked him just eighth among Division I-A punters. He says he often sacrificed his average to help the Rebels and that may have impressed the coaches. Players were chosen for the Kodak team based on their ability to work within the framework of their college teams as well as their individual performance.
