HOLMES DROPS WBC CROWN

Larry Holmes re- Sulaiman accepted Holsigned his World Boxing mes' title resignation. Council world heavyweight title Sunday.

Holmes made the sur-



prise announcement at the final day of the WBC's convention at Caesars Palace, and WBC President Jose

Holmes relinquished the title just as the WBC was to approve a compromise that would have ordered arbitration to resolve Holmes' dispute with promoter Don King over a mandatory defense against No. 1ranked Greg Page.

Sig Rogich, a WBC vice president, said Page now would fight No. 2ranked Tim Witherspoon for the vacant title. The fight reportedly will be held Feb. 24 at a site to be determined.

Holmes had an agreement to fight Page for King, but said he would not fight for the \$2.55 million contract figure.

'Sugar Ray' Plans Return

Former welterweight champion Sugar Ray Leonard, who retired last November after eye surgery, said Saturday night he will fight again, perhaps as early as Febru-

Leonard, 27, boxed two three-round exhibitions Saturday night before making the surprise announcement. He showed some flashes of the quickness that characterized his 32-1 record that included 23 knockouts.

Leonard's last fight was a third round TKO of Bruce Finch on Feb. 15, 1982 in Reno, Nev.

"Yes, I will fight again but it's not a comeback," said Leonard. "I'm back. I've got to get in serious shape and get with (attorney) Mike Trainer and

work out the logistics. Hopefully, I could have a 10-round tuneup by February or March, maybe."

Leonard has steadfastly denied that he would ever return to the ring but there were indi-



cations in recent weeks that he might change his mind. The key to his decision to return may have come last month when he served as a television commentator at the world middleweight title fight between defending champion Marvin Hagler and Roberto Duran, the only man ever to defeat Leonard as a pro.

After the fight, in which Hagler won an unimpressive 15-round unanimous decision, Leonard simply smiled and nodded when fans asked if he felt now that he could beat Hagler. A multi-million dollar bout against Hagler was in the negotiation stage when Leonard sustained his eye injury.

Leonard burst into the public eye in 1976 when he was one of five American fighters to win gold medals at the Olympic Games at Montreal. He reeled off a series of impressive victories as a pro and won the World Boxing Council welterweight title in December, 1979, with a 15th round knockout of defending champion Wilfred Benitez.

Leonard lost his only pro fight when he dropped a 15-round decision to Duran at Montreal in June, 1980, but he regained the title in their rematch in New Orleans
