Michael Jackson Wins Award Of Merit

Singer Michael Jackson, whose "Thriller' album established him as one of the most exciting entertainers on the music scene, dominated_ the American Music Awards Monday with 10 nominations and-a special merit award.

Jackson, 25, will-be presented with the Award of Merit at the 11th annual show Jan. 16 for his "outstanding contributions over a long period of time to the musical entertainment of the American public."

Previous winners were Bing Crosby, Berry Gordy, Jr., Irving Berlin, Johnny Cash, Ella Fitz-gerald, Perry Como, Benny Goodman, Chuck Berry, Stevie Wonder and Kenny Rogers.

In both the pop and soul categories, Jackson was nominated for favorite male vocalist, favorite single for "Billie Jean" and best album for "Thriller," which yielded six hit singles.

He won two nominations in the best video category for "Billie Jean" and "Beat It."

The nominations in three categories were compiled from year-end sales charts of music industry publications and winners are chosen by a public poll of 20,000 people in three categories.
