Dupree Leaves College, Considers Turning Pro FEB. 3 & 10 BOXING CARDS SET FOR SHOWBOAT HOTEL

Former Oklahoma running back Marcus Dupree dropped out of the University of South-Mississippi Tuesday and is considering turning pro.

The NFL said in a terse statement that it would have nothing to do with Dupree until 1987, the year after his Oklahoma class graduates, but an official of the United States Football League said it might be interested in dealing with the 235-pound back.

"I think that really, in my best interests, I cannot comment on that," USFL Commissioner Chet Simmons said at a luncheon in St. Louis. "There is a case in Los Angeles. From what I was told . . . a judge said that our eligibility rule is, per se, a violation of anti-trust laws."

Simmons alluded to a decision relating to a suit filed by former Arizona Wranglers. Boris has since signed with the Los

Angeles Express.

Dupree transferred from Oklahoma to Southern Mississippi last Oct-

ober because he said he couldn't please Sooners Coach Barry Switzer and

because he wanted to be closer to his Philadelphia, Miss., home.

At the time of his transfer, the NCAA ruled he

would not be eligible to play college football again until the 1985 season, which led to specu-

lation that Dupree might not want to stay in college.

Junior welterweight contender Irelis "Cubanito" Perez and a pair of hard-hitting welterweight prospects, Dio Colome and undefeated Reggie Miller, headline the monthly ESPN boxing card Friday, Feb. 3, at the Showboat Hotel, Casino, Country Club and Bowling Center.

Perez meets veteran Ricards Jimenez in a 10-round bout; the Colome-Miller fight also is a 10-rounder.

Four other bouts, including an eight-rounder featuring undefeated Las Vegas junior middleweight Dale Cook, are on the card promoted by Bob Arum's Top Rank, Inc., in association with the Showboat Hotel.

The card — which will be blacked out with no live television coverage in the Southern Nevada
