run a special story on the meeting, the results of which will bridge a gap that has not been spanned since the demise of the educational activities of the Freedmen's Bureau in 1870. AOIP's executive director—referred to as senior volunteer consultant—urged the Secretary to free Black Americans from the shackles of illiteracy. Presently, he said, the greatest need is the strong blessing of DOE. He expressed AOIP's wish to portray Secretary Bell and other supporters from whatever political persuasion in the role of the Second Emancipators.

Next, presentations were made by Ozell Sutton, Carrie Haynes and Sam Banks. Chairman Sutton said that he was both pleased and honored to have this opportunity to meet with the Secretary and thanked him on behalf of all present and those who could not come. He said that he had been involved in the civil rights movement for a long time but he knows




(Left to right) Ozell Sutton, Calvin W. Rolark, and Secretary Bell.

of no other effort like AOIP. It is the greatest networking kind of coming together that Black America has ever known. Education is critical to Black America, Sutton added. Illiteracy is so damaging to our legitimate hopes and aspirations. It impacts on every aspect of life and reflects very badly upon a nation that should not tolerate any degree of illiteracy. The present situation of almost 50 percent functional illiteracy in the Black community is totally intolerable in the United States. We are approaching
