

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Player Dies At 57 PITTSBURGH -

Charles "Chuck" Cooper, who became the first black to play in the National Basketball Association when he was drafted by the Boston Celtics in 1950, died of cancer Sunday in a Pittsburgh hospice. He was

Cooper, who averaged 6.7 points per game in his six seasons in the NBA, later called his pioneering status "a rather dubious achievement. "The Harlem Globe-

trotters were around long before me." Cooper told Pittsburgh Magazine in 1976. "Also a league up in New York state produced many great black players, including Dolly King and Pop Gates. So if I was good enough, plenty before me were equally good."

Cooper, 6-5, entered Duquesne University in 1946 on the GI Bill of Rights, where his presence on the basketball team caused the Univer-
