Daylight Saving

Time Starts Sunday

Millions of Americans will set their clocks forward one hour next Sunday and switch over to Daylight Saving Time, a device designed to save energy by providing more sunlight in the evening hours.

The time change requires that clocks be set forward at 2 a.m. local time on the last Sunday in April. The clocks will be pushed back an hour to Standard Time at 2 a.m. local time on the final Sunday in October.

Hawaii, Arizona, the Eastern Time Zone part of Indiana, Puerto Rico. the Virgin Islands and American Samoa are excluded from the change.

Robert Ross, a Transportation Department attorney and expert on the history of Daylight Saving Time, says the idea dates back to Ben Franklin.

"Franklin was a night person," Ross said in an interview. "While serving as an ambassador in Paris, he wrote a paper about how much candle wax would be saved if

the time switch was not observed in the United States until near the end of World War I. President Wilson, on Mar. 31, 1918, signed the legislation but it was repealed the following year.

During World War II, the practice was again revived to save resources. The clock was advanced on Feb. 9, 1942, and the time was observed until Sept. 30, 1945. In fact, one of the first returns to normalcy after the war was to do away with Daylight Saving Time.

During the energy crisis of 1973 and 1974 the nation went to Daylight Saving Time yearround to conserve energy.

Killing suspect sentenced

Earnest Earl Stewart, awaiting trial for the Jan. 8 murders of Terry and Ricky Collins, was sentenced Friday in District Court to 10 years in prison on two unrelated drug charges.

Stewart, 36, has been held in the Clark County Jail without bail since his Feb. 9 arrest.

Stewart pleaded guilty May 20, 1983, to the charges of offering, agreeing or arranging to sell a controlled substance and possession of controlled substance with intent to sell.

At the time of the killings, a warrant was out for his arrest for failing to appear for sentencing on those charges after he was let out of jail on bail.

The shootings occurred in the Safari Room, at 810 Bonanza Road.

City Council To Allocate \$3 Million In Revenue Sharing Funds

The Las Vegas City Council will meet Apr. 30 at 10 a.m. to allocate \$3 million in federal revenue sharing funds for the current program period.

Funding requests from City departments and community service groups total \$4,575,614 following an Apr. 4 public hearing to consider possible uses for the

City department requests include approximately \$2 million for street improvements, \$700,000 for building and facilities improvement, \$400,000 for Fire Services and \$260,000 for Animal Shelter expansion and renovation. Due to budgetary con-

straints the last few years, many normal maintenance items such as street repair have been delayed.

The past few years, the City Council has maintained a policy of expending revenue sharing money on one-time capital improvements, rather than for ongoing operating expenses of outside agencies. The capital projects funded by past Council allocations include street and traffic improvements, fire safety equipment and motor vehicle replacements, as well as the construction of the City Detention Facility, Senior Citizen Center, Animal Shelter and two fire stations.




