My face is more oily in summer than any other time of the year. What can I do to make it less olly during this warm weather period?

Beverly Dear Beverly,


Use the same cleansing, rinsing treatment you've been using during cooler weather, but decrease the use of your moisturizer to night time only and use a deep poor only and use a deep pore astringent. If you find the switch is too strong, wet your cotton ball with water which will dilute the astringent as you apply the lotion. For the inner treatment, decrease the intake of oily food to charcoal or oven broiled foods; and drink at least three 12-oz. glasses of fresh water daily. Lemonade and sun-tea are refreshing summer drinks and will replenlish the fluids you lose during the hot weather months.

Dear Audrey, Number one, in order to finish the foundation you already have, apply less and blend more. Use a finishing powder over



What do you do about dry skin in the summer? Lisa

Dear Lisa,

For dry skin start with a good brand sun block. For faces, use No. 10 thru 15; 15 is the strongest blocker. Use after your 1,2,3 treatment, your third step being your regular moisturizer. The sun block would be your fourth step before going out in the warm weather. Or you can apply a light foundation, leaving off the powder. Use a cream blusher or gel and lip treatment such as Lip Renew in a tube, which is a conditioning primer to be worn alone or under glosses and lipstick. This will give people with dry skin added protection against the dry heat of our area. Remember, skin treatment vour consists of: 1) Cleansing; 2) Rinsing; and 3) Moisturizing.
