ALPHA/A Unique Summer Program For Children

A unique program of College Classes for Children has been developed and is available for children in grades 1 thru 8 at the Clark County **Community College this** summer. Under the direction of Dr. C. Lavonne Moton, Coordinator of Developmental Education at the college, **ALPHA** (Associated Learning Programs for Human Actuation) will offer programs in reading, math, writing and drama for children in grades 1 thru 6 with additional workshops on computer use and typing for children in grades 6 thru 8. The academic programs are both for remediation and enrichment.

Classes will run June 4 thru July 14, Monday thru Thursday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

ALPHA Programs, as structured and organized activities, may be broadly identified as representing three major thrusts: (1) youth activities/recreational program development and coordination; (2) youth development; and (3) experimental learning opportunities. The programs will be highly visible and will function as a 'second curriculum'' mission for public school children who are not in school for the summer.

Specific workshops include: (1) Alpha Read-ing Skills I for students in grades 1-8, who are in need of remedial reading skills; (2) Alpha Reading Skills II for students in grades 1-8, who want to enrich their already "good" reading skills at or above grade level; (3) Alpha Writing Skills I for students in grades 1-8, who are in need of improving their writing (grammar) skills; Alpha Writing Skills II, for students in grades 1-8, who want to enrich their already "good" writing (grammar) skills at or above grade level; (5) Alpha Math Skills I for students in grades 1-8, who are in need of improving their math skills on grade level; (6) Alpha Math Skills II for students in grades 1-8, who want to enrich their already "good" math skills at or above grade level; (7) Alpha Computer Skills for students in grades 6-8 only, who want to learn basic computer use; (8)

Alpha Typing Skills for students in grades 6-8 only, who want to learn basic typing skills; (9) Alpha Television Drama for students in grades 1-8, who want to learn basic "acting" skills (A play will be televised for private viewing, in which participants are the principal actors and actresses.); and (10) Alpha Arts & Crafts for students in grades 1-6, who want to learn to make home decor items, toys and other handicraft items.

All ALPHA classes will be held at both the Cheyenne Campus and the Henderson Campus, with the exception of Alpha Reading Skills II, Alpha Writing Skills I and Alpha Television Drama, which will be available only at the Cheyenne Campus.

Participants in the program will be required to enroll in at least three (3) of the workshops. Cheyenne Campus fees are \$50 per workshop. The total Cheyenne Campus tuition is therefore \$150, which also includes a daily lunch. Henderson Campus fees are \$45 per workshop, making the total tuition for that campus \$135. However, there will be NO LUNCH provided at the Henderson Campus.

Parents must provide transportation for participants. Each child must arrive no later than 8:50 a.m. and must be picked up no later than 1:10 p.m., Monday thru Thursday only. There are no classes held on Fridays.

Parents/guardians will receive a written report of their child's progress in each workshop at the end of the program period.

Enrollment is limited to 300 participants at the Cheyenne Campus and 100 participants at the Henderson Campus. A 20:2 student-teacher ratio is planned; each workshop will have 20 students, one teacher and one aide. 1984 Alpha participants will be given first priority for the Alpha 1985 workshop offerings.
