Unemployment Problems
Of Black Men Said To Be
Cause of Explosive Growth

WASHINGTON — Unemployment problems of black men, not social trends or the availability of welfare, may be the chief cause of an explosive growth in the number of black families headed by women, a new study suggests.

Tom Joe and Peter Yu of the Washington-based Center for the Study of Social Policy said in their report one solution to the problem may lie in getting black male teenagers into the work force and keeping them there. Without jobs, black men are unlikely to head families, it said.

"Current research emphasizes unwed mothers and inome programs for female-headed families. These data on black men suggest that researchers may be treating the symptoms of poverty rather than the ailment," according to their study, "The Flip Side of Black Families Headed by Women: The Economic Status of Black Men."

The study, released Saturday, said more than 4 million black men—46 percent of the 8.8 million who are of working age — are not in the work

While 78 percent of all working-age white men were employed in 1982, only 54 percent of all working-age black men had jobs, said the study, which used data from the Census Bureau and the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

In addition, some 1.2 million black men of working age (16 to 64) were unemployed in 1982, 1.8 million had dropped out of the labor force, 186,000 were in prison and 925,000 were classified as "missing" because the Census Bureau says it could not locate them.

"The boom in black families headed by women is not the simple result of the 'welfare curse,' pervasive and invidious discrimination or changing sexual mores," the study said.

Since 1960, the number of black families headed by women has nearly tripled from 889,000 to 2.7 million. They accounted for 20.9 percent of all black families in 1960 and 41.9 percent in 1983.

By comparison, nearly 75 percent of all black men were working in 1960, while only 54 percent were working in 1982. The study said "the ranks of black men out of the labor force or unemployed has increased by the same number" as the households led by women.

The study also noted economic progress among blacks in the last two decades has occurred mostly in two-parent families. The poverty rate among such families fell from more than 50 percent in 1959 to 20 percent in 1982.

But the poverty rate among black families where a woman heads the household fell only from 70 percent to 59 percent. Their median income has fallen 14 percent since 1968, while the median for two-parent families has risen 11 percent.
