"Winter in America"

Dr. Charlie Knight, Superintendent of Lynwood United School District in California, delivered a dynamic address to the local high school honor graduates who received scholarships from various community organizations under the auspices of B-CON (Black Community Organizations Network).

Using the topic "Winter in America," Dr. Knight stated that it was winter when we came through the deadly paths of this country. We have survived several long hard winters only through the efforts of this great group which sponsored this occasion today. Only these people can give us hope and only then can the flow of winter melt the ice and give us spring. She continued that in the past we have been steered away from land ownership. She said, "Where I came from the saying was if you don't stand for something you will fall for anything.

After putting in a lot of leg work, brawn and muscles she received \$32 million dollars to build a new school in Lynwood but until today no land can be secured to build this school due to the zoning process. This is regrettable.

Dr. Knight said, "If you are a Black person you have to be excellent to be average. Her job as Superintendent of Lynwood School District is a very challenging one, for she is very outspoken and may not be reappointed, but she is going to continue her fight for equality and a good education for our boys and girls.

She said, "We must teach our children to earn their grades. Don't just give them a grade, teachers, for competition is cold on the outside"

She said that crime in the Black community is complicated by the contributions of the police force. Young people are being harrassed and their only crime is being Black and poor. There are jiggery crimes and police induced crimes....

Dr. Knight concluded with, "My faith in human beings compels me to believe that Spring is bound to arrive if winter comes . . . for "Today is ours — Let's live it. A song is sung — Let's sing it . . . TODAY IS OURS—

LET'S TAKE IT." She received a standing ovation.

Second Baptist and Victory Baptist, which purchased a \$300 table. It is hoped that other churches will participate in like fashion next year.


Sixty percent of the proceeds will go to fight the many legal battles all over the U.S. and 40 percent remains with the branch for its operations.
