Fighters With 72.5% Knockout Ratio At 'Boat

Four outstanding young prospects—with a combined winning record of 90 percent-face off Thursday, July 12, in a double main event on the monthly ESPN boxing card at the Showboat Hotel, Casino, Country Club and Bowling Center.

World-ranked contender Irelis "Cubanito" Perez meets Nevadan Frankie Davis in a 10round junior welterweight bout while hardhitting Felipe Canela takes on powerful Luis Santana in a 10-round welterweight fight.

Between them, these

four main eventers have won 80 fights against only eight losses and three draws.

Their knockout ratio is just as impressive at 72.5 percent.



With the 1984 Summer Olympics scheduled to begin shortly at the end of the month in Los Angeles, all of the United States' team rosters have been completed with the best possible athletes available, thus America should be competitive in every sport entered.

Olympic trials in more than 100 events have determined the teams that will represent the U.S., while also being labeled by many experts as one of the more talented groups ever assembled for the Summer Games.

The U.S. women's team is equally impressive in grabbing the top spot with the likes of Cheryl Miller, Pam McGee, Janice Lawrence, and Kim Mulkey, to lead the way in the chase for the gold.

With all eyes upon Carl Lewis as he continues his quest to capture four gold medals, his performance should be one of many great efforts registered by the mens' track team.

Sprinter Calvin Smith, hurdlers Greg Foster and Edwin Moses, along with the members of both the 4x100 meter and 4x400 meter relay teams, should also turn in excellent efforts in the field events. Lewis is the top long jumper, while other American hopefuls include Billy Olson, the pole vaulter and high jumper Dwight Stones.
