CPB BOARD REAFFIRMS COMMITMENT TO EQUAL EMPLOYMENT

Washington, D.C. -Stricter enforcement of equal employment opportunity within public broadcasting stations is being sought by the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB).

At its June 28 meeting, the Board of Directors unanimously passed a resolution introduced by

five minutes.

Howard White, a member of the Board, "Although progress in hiring minorities and women has been good in public broadcasting, it is still inadequate," he said.

A number of public broadcasting stations do not employ minorities in full- or part-time executive, professional or

technical positions. The resolution will address this situation. The resolution recom-

mends that CPB management advise the Secretary of the Department of Health and **Human Services (HHS)** to promptly adopt and enforce regulations relating to equal employment opportunity. As mandated by federal statutes, HHS is the department responsible for enforcing EEO for public broadcasting.

The Corporation will

further analyze data on the employment of minorities and women at public broadcasting stations to identify options for diversifying employment at stations, to be presented to the CPB Board in November.

In other Board action. funding for Fiscal Year 1985 Tune-In Advertising for television and radio was approved by the CPB Board. Public television will receive \$700,000, and public radio will receive \$200,000 in Tune-In monies.
