Boycotting Crime Through Literacy Enablement

NMBC is indeed a sharp departure from "crime prevention" schemes which exacerbate this critical problem by a calculated and insidious use of welfare dependency and illiteracy. "Black people," says Julian Garfield, "are not 'making it' and will have a difficult time doing so as long as illiteracy and crime continue to pluck from the flock the cream of the crop."


Anticipating the high demand for education as a survival technique, NMBC has aligned itself with the national Assault On Illiteracy Program (AOIP) and Julian Garfield is a co-chairperson of the Assault On Illiteracy Gouncil. A significant portion of AOIP's literacy-deprived target population, 18 year old and older who read at or below a fourth grade level, is among the thousands of Blacks that are incarcerated in America's jails and prisons.

Prisons don't educate; they don't correct; they don't rehabilitate. Prison is *punitive* and *isolating*. AOIP volunteers penetrate these institutions bringing help to the helpless and hope to the hopeless.

NMBC challenges American society to work to achieve a pronounced and measurable reduction in violent crime. Crime, as we see it today, is a burden we need not continue to bear. Crime abatement, NMBC says, is the final challenge. Let's join together to build more citizens, not prisoners!
