FIVE MINORITY BUSINESSES HONORED AT NEDCO ANNUAL AWARDS LUNCHEON

Five minority-owned businesses were honored Friday during Nevada Development Company's awards luncheon, and recognition was also given to the city of Las Vegas, Valley Bank and the Nevada Department of Transportation.

Grand Prix Auto Body Shop owner Angel Rodriguez was recognized by the Small Business Administration as the Nevada Minority Small Businessperson of the year.

The tenure award, for businesses more than 10 years old, was given to Hair Unlimited and Gornowich Sand and Gravel.

TWT Electrical Corp. and DLC Telephone Repair and Sales, each less than 18 months old, were honored as the year's most promising businesses.

Valley Bank, and in particular its North Las Vegas branch, was recognized for participating in loan and credit programs enabling minority and small businesses to get started.

The Nevada DOT was honored for awarding 11 percent of its contracts to minority- and women-owned businesses.

The city of Las Vegas was given a special award for its cooperation in funding minority projects, and for its commitment to economic development.

The Las Vegas Sentinel-Voice received the Small Business Administration Certificate of Appreciation "in recognition of outstanding support and dedicated effort to benefit the small businesses of our nation."

Linus Kojelis, associate director of the White House Office of Public Liaison for Ethnic Affairs, praised minority-owned businesses throughout the country for their contributions to the American economy. He said they had overcome legal, economic and racial barriers over the years.

"That great economic train that President Reagan referred to in July 1983, is moving ahead, and tickets have been issued to all Americans," he said. "But they are no longer satisfied to ride that train — they want to be the conductors, the engineers and the firemen on that train — and minority businesses make that possible."
