

Drugs seem to be the greatest hazard to youth securing the kind of education they need to face the future.

Why do people take drugs? The reasons for drug use vary from indi-vidual to individual. Most reasons fall within these three categories: Relief from tension, upset, and emotional stress; relief from actual physical pain; and relief from the constant barrage of problems forced on the individual by today's complex society.

What do drugs do? Drugs dull the perceptions and the senses. Besides causing blank periods in one's memory, drugs lessen the ability to concentrate. A wooden feeling might be a very good description of the state that drugs put one in. This feeling, along with lessening the ability to con-centrate is one of the major causes of educational failure among our young people. When classed as hal-

lucinogenics, drugs give the person unreal mental pictures and sensations of the present environment. Therefore hallucinogenic drugs should never be used by someone trying to study. Both mental and physical damage can occur from continual use or from overdose of drugs.
