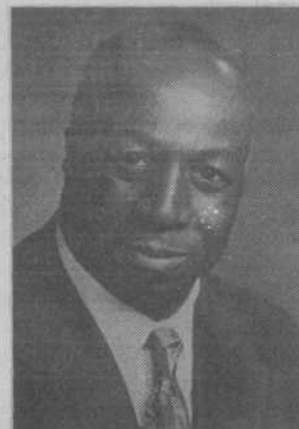
Nine nabbed on drug charges

Seven Las Vegas men and two juveniles were arrested on drug charges at a local pool parlor and amusement hall late Saturday night after Metropolitan Police ended a night of surveillance by closing in on the group.

According to news reports, three police officers allegedly watched drug transactions taking place at Crystal Palace Billiards No. 2, 2411 E. Bonanza Road.

Ernest Anderson, 23, Brian Salerno, 19, Michael Chase, 20, Omar Perez, 18, Troy Longley, 19, Michael Conley, 22, and William Kreb, 26, were the adults arrested in the operation. The names of the juveniles arrested were not released.

NEW YORK — Jerome H. Holland, national chairman of the American Red Cross, a former ambassador to Sweden and the first black member of the

board of the New York Stock Exchange, died Sunday after a long illness. He was 79.

Holland, who died at New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center of an undisclosed illness, was ambassador to Sweden from 1970 to 1972, when he joined the exchange's board. He was president of Hampton Institute in Hampton, Va., from 1960 to 1970 and president of Delaware State College in Dover, Del., from 1953 to 1960.

He was also the football coach at Lincoln University, Pennsylvania, after graduation from Cornell University.

A native of Auburn, Holland lived in Bronxville, N.Y. He was a trustee emeritus of Cornell University and a presidential adviser at Cornell.

NLV Councilman William Robinson said of former NLV Housing Authority Executive Director during investigations on the performance of that office, "I don't know at this stage whether he is pulling the wool over our eyes or just being naive."

Said former County Commissioner Woodrow Wilson to his fellow Commissioners when resigning following his guilty plea for accepting a bribe from an undercover FBI agent: "Throughout my political career I have sought effective avenues for responding to the needs of my constituency."

"I can't believe the people in the community would sign a petition to recall an elected official because he doesn't believe in giving taxpayer's dollars to a credit union," said LV City Councilman Bob Nolen during efforts of some to seek his recall.
