

Keith Hoggard killed after argument Sunday

An argument between a 27-year-old man and a Westside woman ended early Sunday with the man dead in his car after he allegedly was shot several times with a rifle by a 15-year-old Las Vegas youth, Metropolitan Police said.

Keith David Hoggard, address unknown, was found dead in the front seat of his car at 8:40 a.m., police said. He had been shot several times with a rifle, officials said.

Pistol-whipped man in stable condition

A 44-year-old man was pistol-whipped and possibly shot in the face near a Westside restaurant Saturday afternoon, Metropolitan Police said.

Charles Williams, address unknown, was in stable condition at Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital late Saturday, a hospital spokesman said. Williams suffered injuries to the face when he was pistol whipped and possibly shot outside Big Daddy's Restaurant at 12:30 p.m., police said.

Mack Mason, 1916 Lawry Ave., was a suspect in the mid-afternoon incident, police said.

Police said Hoggard and an unidentified Westside woman at 903 Weaver Drive argued shortly before the shooting. Hoggard allegedly was run out of the house by the 15-year-old, but returned moments later with a tennis racket he used to smash one of the house's windows.

Police said no arrests had been made and the investigation was continuing Sunday afternoon.

Jackson stalled by South Africa

WASHINGTON — The South African ambassador informed the Rev. Jesse Jackson Saturday it is "not opportune" for him to visit South Africa next month, but invited him to try again later.

Jackson requested a visa to attend the Feb. 3 installation of Nobel peace prize winner Desmond Tutu as Anglican bishop of Johannesburg.

There was no immediate comment from Jackson.

BUSH: Black leaders 'may not be in step'

WASHINGTON—Vice President George Bush, who often has been the administration's emissary to black groups, echoed President Reagan Saturday, saying leaders of old-line black organizations "may not be in step" with their members.

At a press conference, Bush was asked if he agreed with Reagan's comments in a USA Today interview published Friday, in which the president said black leaders are too committed to the Democratic party to support his

business-oriented approach to helping blacks.

"I have come to the conclusion that maybe some of those leaders are protecting some rather good positions that they have and they can protect them better if they keep their constituency aggrieved and believing that they have a legitimate complaint," Reagan said.

Bush said he would not comment on what Reagan said, but, drawing on his 1983 experi-

ence addressing the NAACP convention in New Orleans where he was booed, the vice president said, "Those organizations fought us in 1980 . . . I think some of these organizations who come to us with an old agenda when America is thinking of a new agenda, new ideas, may not be in step with how we should talk about benefiting their constituencies."

Reagan met last week with a handpicked group of black businessmen, educators and community leaders, drawing criticism from heads of established black organizations.

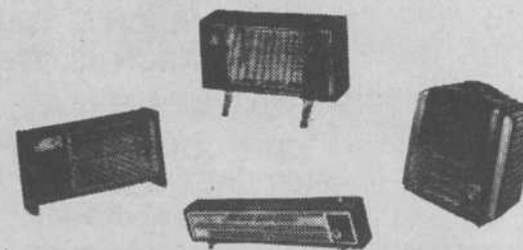
