It's been a long hard road for Olga and Nayman Webb, owners of Olga's Beauty and Barber Supply. In retrospect, they had set goals many years ago but found the treading rough. Olga recalls her first job in Las Vegas. It all unfolded during 1973

move to Las Vegas," said Olga Webb. "The oil crisis was on and we just felt that we should try for greener pastures-a newer environment." Shortly after arriving

in Las Vegas, she started to work for Nate Collins.

Approximately a year later, the Webbs had a vision of developing their own beauty supply business.

It all started in what was then identified as the Golden West Shopping Center. They set up shop at 1056 W. Owens, next to the NAACP office. "We started it on faith and a "shoestring," recalled Olga. "When we set up, it was decided to call our first venture OLGA'S. It seemed appropriate at the time due to my beauty supply experience. We created a need for the people,"

she continued. "They appeared to be 20 years behind in getting the service and product indigenous to the population. Our goal, when we set it up, was to give personal attention and service.'

The road in those early days at their initial location was not easy. They experienced a number of "break-ins" and suffered considerable theft. "They came through the ceiling, the doors and windows. We had been hit with big losses," said Nayman. Olga remembered an incident where a youth fell through the roof and landed near Nayman in the store.

Despite these hurdles, their hearts were pure

and they forever remained concerned about the plight of the needy. Actually, the Webbs, during the '70's,

contributed heavily during the then Radio Station KVOV's Christmas Project at the Shopping Center. They would deliver truck loads of food, clothing and toys.

They never failed to give to those in need.

NEXT WEEK: Olga Webb had been hospitalized for a number of operations including heart bypass, leg bypass and kidney bypass. The Webbs expanded their operations to two more Las Vegas stores and one in Sparks, Nev.


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Pictured above is the first Olga's Beauty and Barber Supply outlet, then situated at the Golden West Shopping Center.
