WASHINGTON, D.C. — Two fellowships for minority reporters and producers will be funded by the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB). The fellowships, anticipated to be \$10,000 each, are for the Kiplinger Graduate Program in Public Affairs and Reporting in the School of Journalism at The Ohio State University. As a result of

CPB's financial support, the university has agreed to waive all tuition and fees for graduate students appointed as Kiplinger Fellows.

YOUNGSTER VIDEOTAPE IDENTIFICATION PROGRAM ANNOUNCED BY KLAS-TV

Las Vegas...KLAS-TV, Channel 8 will open its studios on Saturday, Feb. 16 from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. for a "Youngster Videotape Identification Program." Parents are encouraged to have a videotape of their youngsters on hand at all times.

Any parent wishing to take part in this identification program is asked to bring a VHS or Beta videotape and their child to the KLAS-TV, Channel 8 studios at 3228 Channel 8 Drive (located between Convention Center Drive and Desert Inn Road) Saturday, Feb. 16 between the hours of 9 a.m. and 1

p.m. At that time, Channel 8 will videotape and fingerprint any youngster at no charge.

"The Atlanta Child Murders," airing on CBS and Channel 8 Sunday, Feb. 10 and Tuesday, Feb. 12 has prompted KLAS-TV to recognize a need for this type of identification program of the city of Las Vegas. Metro Police will be available at the Channel 8 studios to answer questions that parents or youngsters may have regarding safety and prevention of kidnapping and abduction.

According to John Hayes, Vice President and General manager of

KLAS-TV, Channel 8 is offering this service to the public in the hope that no one will ever need to forward this video of a child to law authorities, but encourages every parent in our community to have one as a safety precaution.

You do not need to own a video player, you need only purchase one inexpensive VHS or Beta videotape and bring it to the Channel 8 studios for the taping of your child. When you return home with your videotape and fingerprint card, both should be stored with your other valuable documents in a safe place.
